

"And whatsoever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God and the Father by Him":

There is one questions which all of us face at sometime in our lives as Christians -"Can I succeed as a Christian? Both those of us who have chosen to enter into a closer tie with God, through a Religious Order face the same question -- only more intensely. If we count on our own strength to take us through -- we can almost count on failure. If we rely on the grace and strength of Christ -- we can be successful.

Entering an Order at the first time is always met with some fear and questioning. And then, as in the case of Brothers Andrew and Thomas Joseph, the questions arise again when they prepare for the second stage of the journey -- the time of being a Novice. And, it is for this reason that the Postulancy and Novitiate exist as a time of questioning and searching. All of this time -- indeed the whole of our lives as Religious is a waiting on the Holy Spirit. In Second Corinthians we find a key phrase: "My Grace is sufficient for thee". The word sufficient implies there is enough Grace and then some to spare.

When we pray about our accomplishments and our failures, how much is a product of our own wisdom and effort? Both the Bible and our experiences teach us that "God makes His sun to rise on the good and the evil -- and sends rain on the just and the unjust." All that we have, we owe to God!

Through the testing times of Postulancy and Novitiate we are constantly tapped on the shoulder by the Holy Spirit. When we go through these times we all try to keep in mind that we are doing this for God -- as the Brotherhood says -- To God Alone The Glory.

As Christians, we have a source of strength not enjoyed by everyone. And, as Christians in a Religious Order we have this strength, magnified a hundred times over, because we draw on a family -- whether in a common household or in the world.

By doing all we do in the name of our Christ, we are receptors of the Holy Spirit. The Christian is the agent through which the Holy Spirit does his work. Electricity can do wonders, but it must flow through conductors. We are conductors of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit has given to us for <u>USAGE not STORAGE</u>. When we take these various steps in the Religious Life, we pledge ourselves to <u>USAGE</u>. And when we begin to use the Holy Spirit in our lives and in our deeds, we will draw on the Love of Christ as one of the gifts of the Holy Spirit as promised to us in Galatians 5, verses 22 and 23. The Holy Spirit will produce the fruit of love in the genuine Christian. It is the nature of birds to sing and they will sing. It is the nature of the genuine Christian to love and love they will because the Love of Christ controls us, as promised in scripture.

When you enter an Order: when you make those promises to follow and live the Rule, to keep the percepts -- to observe the traditions, you then consecrate yourself to God. You as the Religious to the consecrating to God -- God through the Holy Spirit does the sanctifying. On Mt. Carmel, Elijah consecrated the offering -- but God sanctified the offering -- answering with fire. When the Holy Spirit sanctifies us, a life of holiness will naturally follow.

If you do nothing e se as a Brother -- open your life to the Holy Spirit. When the Holy Spirit comes, He grants power for Service. Jesus promised his disciples "You shall receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you". The heart cry of every Religious and indeed every Christian is this cry for Power in the Holy Spirit. But the power to do all for Christ and to live for Him -- to accept Him as the director of your life must have purpose. And the purpose is to witness for Christ and serve Him.

Once a group of clergymen were discussing whether to have D. L. Moody the famous fundamentalist preacher address them. One very unimpressed minister asked: "Does D. L. Moody have a monopoly on the Holy Spirit? Another answered quickly: No, but the Holy Spirit does seem to have a monopoly in Mr. Moody!

It ought to be your prayer and mine, Brothers and friends -- and our purpose -- for the Holy Spirit to have a monopoly on our lives

They never let me do that for I keep interposing jokes into the readings.

From time to time I shall write and tell you some of my experiences and hope you will write to me.

Verily, I say unto you, they <u>have</u> their reward. But you, when you fast, anoint your head, and wash your face; that you appear not to men to fast, but unto your Father which is in secret: and your Father which sees in secret will reward you openly. LAY NOT UP FOR YOURSELVES TREASURES UPON EARTH, where moth and rust doth corrupt, and where

thieves break through and steal; BUT LAY UP FOR YOURSELVES TREASURES IN HEAVEN, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal: FOR WHERE YOUR TREASURE IS, THERE WILL YOUR HEART BE ALSO.

As creatures of this earthly life, there is little doubt that each of us has had the occasion to confess taking on the role of a hypocrite. Our Lord tells us through his servant Matthew, of our reward for showing forth insincere piety...we are promised that the only benefit reaped for such works is that which might be gained on earth by feeling that we've "fooled" those persons around us. This certainly does not apply solely to fasting!! We must, particularly at this time of remembering Jesus' sufferings, keep watch on our inner-most relationship with the Father, which sees in secret.

We are not called upon to demonstrate to <u>others</u> great outpourings of lamentation; we are not called upon to give credence to the <u>works</u> of <u>others</u>, or to follow in their footsteps. We are, however, called upon to do some spiritual "housecleaning"... "anoint your head..." and "wash your face..." or in modern terms: "rid our minds of earthly concerns" and "prepare ourselves, our souls and bodies as living sacrifices to the Heavenly Father."....that you do not appear to <u>men</u> to be sincere, but unto your Father which is able to see your secrets.."

Our minds, our bodies and our souls must be prepared ... our lives must be put in order, so that we can be receptive to the benefits offered us during this season. We are told, very clearly, that the treasures of this Earth (in whatever form they might be manifest) are of a commodity which does not allow room for the Father, nor are they capable of reserving us a space in the world to come. We are not offered the option of collecting a few treasures upon Earth and a few treasures in Heaven.

Each of us can be spiritually motivated through words of praise bestowed upon us by a thoughtful earthly superior...but, cannot our spiritual well-being be more uplifted with the knowledge that our Father in Heaven sees even the most secret acts of piety offered in His Name?

LET US PRAY: Almighty God, who hatest nothing that Thou hast made and dost forgive the sins of all those who are penitent; create and make in us, new and contrite hearts, that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our wretchedness may obtain of Thee, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ, Our Lord. AMEN.
