By this action however, God did not cease to be perfect God also, but added the pure human nature to his divine nature. Thus we rightfully say our Lord possesses two natures, those being: the nature of God and the nature of man united in one divine person, whole and without confusion and that being for all time. What happened that night so long ago when Jesus Christ was born in Bethlehem? Absolutely the greatest event in all the world, for Jesus Christ - true God and true man - came to dwell among us, as our Savior, our Lord and our God.

This then is the night in our Church's cycle of time when we again recall that great event of the birth of Jesus Christ. We usually do this by celebrating a glorious midnight Mass with all the majesty, beauty and honor befitting a new-born king.

Joy ,to the world, the Lord has come!

Our gratitude for God's love is expressed in our love to our fellow man. We cannot love God except through others -- and when we love others, we love God. The second commandment is "Love thy neighbor as thyself." It is a follow-up of the first command.
