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HE IS THE RISEN LORD "Who do you say that I am?"

We began our journey towards the glorious Resurrection of the Son of God on a morning six weeks ago; we've been on a very earnest quest. We picked up the question asked by the people of Jerusalem -- Who is this Jesus?" At First, the answers seemed to flow out of the very substance of life itself -- "He is a man, a prophet, a teacher, a healer." But once we considered the possibility, "He is the Son of God," the question suddenly seemed to hang in the air. For this answer does not come out of the data of history, but out of the stuff of faith; and thus we were forced to confront a more probing and personal question, "Who do you say that I am?" On Easter morning, however, we encounter the most unbelievable answer of all -- "He is the risen Lord!!"

Many have difficulty with the answer of Easter -- some say right out, "I just can't believe that!" If that's the way it is with you, I can assure you, my brothers and sisters, that you are in good company -- your reaction is not all that unusual. Even the disciples had difficulty. In Luke we read, "Their words seemed to them as idle tales, and they believed them not."

What would be the characteristics of this new life, this Easter gift from the risen Lord? It would be a joyous assurance that we are not alone. Because he is alive, we have now heard a voice speaking from outside this universe -- and know that the most important element in this created order is not matter, or atoms, or black holes, but faith, hope and love -- things human yet divine, living things.

Because of the risen Lord we also know a power stronger than death. We need to meet Jesus as the risen Lord when we stand in the ruins of our own defeats, in the shadows of death -- of our loved ones and of ourselves. Because on Easter we meet the risen Lord, it sparks something so personal in us that our conviction is strengthened to become part of what endures, even though shaken.

The good news about Easter is, "He is the risen Lord." Jesus of Nazareth lives for you, as he aid for my two brothers Edward and Robert. Jesus of Nazareth died for you, as he did for ray mother and father. Jesus of Nazareth was raised from the dead for you, as he did for me and all mankind.

Recall what the angelic messenger said to those fearful women: "Do not be amazed; you seek Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He is risen, he is not here -- see the place where they laid him." For Easter is not merely saying something about the extension of this life, but the glorious creation of a new life.

What a glorious life can be ours!
What a glorious life we still have with him!
For now we know the truth of it:
Now who do you say I am?
"He is the risen Lord''

It was not the end at all, but just the beginning. This beginning, in which the only begotten Son of Goa overcame death and opened to us the gate of everlasting life, that we might be raised from the death of sin by the life-giving Spirit of God, who lives and reigns for ever and ever. Amen.
