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### LOVING OUR NEIGHBORS

In our home we have two thirty-gallon fish tanks. One of the tanks is a community tank. The other has one fish approximately twelve inches long. This fish cannot be kept in the community tank because he preys on smaller and less aggressive fish.

Are we sometimes like this fish? Do we not sometimes feed on the weaker or the non-aggressive person? Do we make little of another's problems or accomplishments? Do we make our family or friends around us feel insecure or unwanted?

God provided each of us with a brain and sometimes with certain talents. For some of us it is being able to sing, while others play the piano or some other musical instrument; for some it's being able to lead others to do good works. You aren't really part of a community if you join only in order to glorify yourself, to use your talent or skill only in lording it over others. We must remember that it is just as important to be an usher or a money-counter as it is to sing in the choir or to play the organ in your parish. It is also as important to be a part of the congregation in the pews as it is to serve at the altar.

Those who have a God-given talent should thank him for it and use it for his glory, unselfishly sharing their gift.

Do not be like my fish, feeding on your less talented associates, or crowding them out. Realize that the less apparent gifts or talents might be the rarer and more valued by God. Don't use your gifts as a way to please yourself. Use them to help those others to find a place in the community. This is what community living and loving are all about: using the gifts God has given to build up the Church in the likeness of Christ.

Love your neighbors not because they are like you, but because they are different from you.

A church becomes institutionalized when its members are related primarily to it as an institution rather than to Christ.


A church becomes institutionalized when its primary concern is turned inward and its chief concern is with its existence, not with its reason for existence.

A church becomes institutionalized when form replaces the Spirit, when the Spirit is lost and only form remains. Form is acceptable, but not having the Spirit is not acceptable. A church is either alive by the Spirit as a part of the body of Christ or it is dead.
