Founder's Forum A Faith for Monday Morning

We hope to gain strength from our worship; we receive the Bread of Life and bring that blessing into our lives through the week. God ordained the Sabbath rest, the time of refreshment. The sacraments and the scriptures give us that strength. When we leave the place of worship, we do not put our faith to rest until the next time. Or at least I hope we don't!

We are "in the midst of a crooked and perverse generation" in the words of the Apostle. Note the tragedies in Colorado and Kosovo for examples. The world is the place where our faith is tested. When Paul told his friends that they were to shine as lights he used a very strong word. He did not mean the light as generated by a candle; he meant the light as shone by a star — a constant beam to shine in a dark and evil world. The world of Paul's time and our world today are not much different.

God does not work on a human timetable. The results of the light we share may not be seen in our time. The starlight takes many years to make its cosmic journey. A teacher often does not see the results of her efforts until years later. Our faith must be far-sighted, raised to the stars, when the results are hidden.

We are in a very evil world: Kosovo, Colorado, places foreign and domestic, and the list is long. Our day of worship is so important if we are to carry the light of Christ. The important thing is that we are to be bearers of the light. Jesus calls us to this everyday ministry of living, of loving, and of working in ways to reflect the light of God's glory — revealed in God alone.

Much work was accomplished in an effort to draft a significant revision and updating of the community's governing documents (The Rule, Constitution and Customary) in time for presentation to the General Chapter during Annual Convocation in July. Notable on Council's agenda were the nominations to life profession of Charles Edward and Andrew, and Patrick Ignatius' request to make first vows was given a nod of approval. Chicago was interviewed and approved for postulant-prospective status, and Council approved plans and a budget for the festivities celebrating the autonomy of the Sisters of Saint Gregory, which will take place at Graymoor during Annual Convocation in July. Council also approved Ellen's request for withdrawal from the novitiate.

The Education Committee continued its work on the third portion of the community's new education program. The first two sections, *Gregorian Foundations* and *The Skillfulness of Shepherds* will be augmented by *Equipping the Saints*. This volume will explore issues surrounding ministry development and discernment, taking as models saints from *Lesser Feasts and Fasts*. Each saint or group of saints exemplifies some aspect of ministry (for example, Starting a New Ministry, When to Say No, Dealing with Stress and Burnout, and Witness to the World). In addition to excellent reflections on each topic penned by Karekin Madteos, the volume includes excerpts from each saint's own writings (or supplementary material from the tradition). As the General Convention noted in 1994, by recognizing and commemorating these witnesses from the past, "their examples and fellowship continue to nurture the pilgrim Church on its way to God." While trusting that *Equipping the Saints* will serve the Gregorian community well, we also hope that others might find it useful as they grow in service of God and their fellow pilgrims.

Yonkers, New York

Province II held a Lenten Quiet Day at Saint Paul's, Yonkers, New York, on the Saturday following the Patronal Feast of Saint Gregory the Great. The theme was "Forgiveness" and featured meditations offered by Tobias Stanislas and Patrick Ignatius. Retreats provide the opportunity to sit alone in reflection or to chat quietly with one's brothers. The Holy Eucharist was celebrated by Tobias Stanislas and he used the occasion formally to dedicate the icon of Saint Gregory the Great which he had written

the previous year. Saint Gregory's icon is one of five which currently grace the reredos at the high altar of Saint Paul's Church. Though the day began chilly and overcast, it developed into a fine early spring afternoon and provided the opportunity for those who wanted to stroll around the grounds to do so and enjoy the bright sunshine.

At the April meeting of the vestry of Saint Paul's, Yonkers, James was elected treasurer of the parish and Patrick Ignatius was elected as one of three assistant treasurers. James adds this new "hat" to the several others he wears, including that of treasurer of the Brotherhood for the past eleven years, and Patrick Ignatius is also one of the two wardens of Saint

Paul's. The servant ministry takes on many and diverse faces, and Gregorian friars and sisters will often be found working behind the scenes in parish and diocesan offices, as well as at the Episcopal Church Center in New York City. We are constantly reminded and are always thankful that the charismatic gift of administration was first discerned by Saint Paul himself as among the fundamental expressions of the action of the Holy Spirit through God's people and in the church. Fessenden Recovery Ministries, Inc. has recently completed its incorporation. This "spin-off" of the Agapé Fund has evolved over the last two years. Fessenden House began as a residence for men living with AIDS, but as new treatments and therapies have become available, the population best served by the Fessenden House model diminished, and it became clear that new needs were emerging. Fessenden Recovery Ministries now provides a home — in the fullest sense of the word — for men in recovery (drug and/or alcohol addiction). The prayerful atmosphere at Fessenden House, the clear "house rules" and the fellowship of shared meals and living help pro-

vide the residents with support towards return to independent, responsible living. Christopher Stephen and Patrick Ignatius serve as staff of the House, and Tobias Stanislas is president of the board. We are also happy to announce that Bishop Catherine Roskam has accepted the position of honorary president. Fessenden House, named in memory of Bernard Fessenden, BSG, is also dedicated

to the "Martyrs of Memphis" — Sisters of Saint Mary and two priests who served heroically during the Yellow Fever epidemic of 1878. By happy synchronicity, Saint Paul's Church recently received as a gift the mid-19th-century wooden altar that had originally served in Saint Mary's Hospital for Children in Manhattan (later moved to Queens). In the church there are no coincidences!

New York City

1999 brought Richard Thomas a significant change in his ministry. After nearly two decades as Assistant to the Secretary of the General Convention of the Episcopal Church, the restructuring of responsibilities within the Episcopal Church Center during the first year of the administration of Presiding Bishop Frank T Griswold created a new position which seems to be directly designed for Richard Thomas: Associate Liturgical Officer. He now works with the Rev Dr Clayton Morris, the church's Liturgical Officer, and this new role gives ample scope for Richard Thomas' gifts in the realm of sacred music and liturgical worship, while he continues his long-standing responsibility as Deputy Registrar for Consecrations. A third new hat has also come his way, that of Deputy to the Secretary of the House of Bishops, the Rt Rev Mary Adelia McLeod. And the year has barely even begun!

Thomas Mark has been formally ensconced as the new Assistant Secretary of the Convention of the Diocese of New York, and has been busily preparing for the session that will have met by the time you receive this edition. Tobias Stanislas, outgoing Assistant Secretary, is scheduled this year to serve as Chaplain to the Convention.

Tobias Stanislas was also busy working with the youth of the diocese this year. Taking part in the annual Acolyte Festival, he presented an "Instructed Eucharist" to a group of about forty acolytes, parents and friends, and then served as "Marshall of

cuss practical issues such as vocational development, formation, training and education.

The church's canons define Episcopal Christian Communities as societies of Christians in communion with the See of Canterbury, living in voluntary commitment to a rule for life or a term of years. These rules vary considerably from one community to another, although there are many common points, the chief of which is prayer and spiritual discipline. Some rules require life in common; others adopt or adapt the traditional vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience; some embrace celibacy as an apostolic tool for ministry. Some rules encourage their members to live in the larger world, working like the proverbial
