AN IMPORTANT SUMMER FOR THE COMMUNITY

Many of you, our readers, are aware that the Brotherhood was founded at the Visitation Monastery in Riverdale, the Bronx, NY. That house of the order was closed many years ago and the sisters dispersed to other houses across the country. This summer, during our Annual Convocation, the brothers are going by bus to what is now the Cardinal O'Connor Residence for Priests. It will be the first time I have been there in more than forty years and it is an opportunity for the community and me to see and feel the spot where we began in 1969. It was earlier that summer when I met the two extern sisters, Rose Angela and Mary Rose. They saw something. They were the ones who said, "You must come and meet Mother." And so I did—and it all began.

Summer—a time for refreshment and rejuvenation. That summer a seed was waiting to germinate, and when I met with Mother Mary Anduze and Sr Margaret Mary—the seed was watered and cultivated—by Margaret Mary, later Helen Marie, VHM. The seed sprouted and grew, and in time bore fruit, fruit that we pray will last. The sisters grew as well, as I conducted choir rehearsals for them—with the Hymnal 1940. And we brothers grew from that point, too. Many years later, we heard that the house would close. As I write this in early May, I came across the history of that house, "Story of a Monastery," where it is recorded that on March 24, 1901, Archbishop Corrigan told the sisters who were waiting word of their new home, "Your new monastery will be in Riverdale; the contract was signed yesterday."

It was May 1 of that year when the sisters took possession of the new monastery. This was a new day for them; a new life in a new place. I feel the connection keenly—it was May when I met the sisters in 1969—out under the big oak tree; it is May as I write these words. The stone for the monastery was quarried from the land on which it stood, and some of the sisters were known to say, "The monastery grew out of the ground." The Brotherhood of Saint Gregory "grew" out of that place—that spirit of foundation and nurture.

We—my brothers and I—share in the Salesian spirit. Many of us wear the sets of side beads that the sisters in Riverdale gave us. Mine have Helen Marie's spirit on them; they were hers and she goes with me. Pray for us as we visit the place of our birth. Pray for the sisters in their several houses across the land. We thank God for the vision realized at that time in that place. We are humbled and thankful.

Spring Council Meeting 2015

The Brotherhood's Council met at the Saint Lawrence Retreat Center of the Capuchin Friars in Beacon, New York, in mid-April. As usual, this meeting contained a hefty agenda, including the vote to accept the formal requests from David Luke Henton (of the Diocese of Texas), David John Batrick (Newcastle, NSW, Australia) and Francis Jonathan Bullock (Indianapolis) for life profession of vows. (Shortly after the Council Meeting, in accordance with the Brotherhood's constitution, all life professed brothers were polled regarding these life professions and solidly endorsed them.) We send David Luke, David John and Francis Jonathan our warmest congratulations as they now prepare for this liturgy of commitment to take place during Annual Convocation in mid-August!

The election of officials for the community took place at this meeting, as follows:

- ☐ Director of Postulants and Novices: Francis Sebastian Medina (California)
- ☐ Director of Public Relations: James Teets (New York)
- ☐ Treasurer: James Teets (New York)
- ☐ Director of Convocation Liturgy and Music: Nathanael Deward Rahm (Chicago)
- ☐ Convocation Infirmarian: Joseph Basil Gauss (Chicago)

All terms are for three years and begin as of Annual Convocation 2015.

Elections took place for the officers and the board of directors of The Brotherhood of Saint Gregory, Inc.

A major feature of each Spring Council Meeting is the annual approval of Brotherhood Outreach Grants. The following charitable organizations received approval for their grant requests:

- ☐ Saint Paul's Episcopal Church in Chattanooga, toward the ongoing response ability of the Chattanooga Outreach Fund in providing response to the homeless and the hungry in their area;
- ☐ Fessenden Supportive Housing, Inc, in Yonkers, New York, which cares for men in addiction recovery;
- ☐ Saint John's Episcopal Church in South Salem, New York, toward the development and maintenance of their music program;
- ☐ Saint James School in Philadelphia, toward their general operating expenses; and
- ☐ Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in South River, New Jersey, toward the general operating expenses of their Calico Threads Thrift Shop, which serves the wider community.

Though the Brotherhood is not primarily a charity—rather it is a religious community which provides support for the ministries of its members—but it is a great pleasure to be able to provide financial grant support in response to requests by our brothers, toward ministries in which they are personally involved.

Spring Council adopted resolutions creating two new provinces—Province 3 and Province 7, aligned with The Episcopal Church's provinces—which increases our in-

ternal structure to a total of seven provinces. Both of these new provinces will meet and elect ministers provincial during Annual Convocation this summer, and these elections will add two new members to Council.

Confronting the questions of file and document retention, Council appointed Tobias Stanislas Haller (chair) and John Henry Ernestine to start a committee to draft guidelines addressing these important matters. As can be imagined, a community such as the Brotherhood, which owns no real property, has a number of issues regarding file retention and archival storage, and hopefully this new committee will come up with some creative answers that will aid us all.

Council received and accepted the request for withdrawal from the community of Charles Edward LeClerc. He remains in our prayers as we wish him Godspeed in his continued journey in Christ Jesus.

Council interviewed two more applicants to the postulancy. One has chosen not to continue the process, but the other is now a postulant-prospective; this means that, God willing, the Brotherhood will admit a total of three to the postulancy at Annual Convocation this summer! Congratulations all around!

Province 2

In January, Saint John's South Salem NY celebrated "Brother Rick Day" observing 25 years of Richard John Lorino's ministry there, 23 of those years as organist and choirmaster. Following the special liturgy, there was a wonderful coffee hour with sumptuous treats and a delicious cake that read "Brother Rick makes our hearts sing Rejoice"!



Province 4

Ron Fender reports on his new ministry in Chattanooga: "We are in the process of beginning a prayer ministry at Saint Paul's Church and I will be very involved. I will be spending time at the church in prayer once a week as a volunteer. Anyone who needs someone to pray with will be welcome to come; I will also be offering the Daily Offices in Saint George's Chapel there. We are also forming a prayer circle of people who will be united in serving the congregation and community in this ministry. Our church is in a time of transition and I am so thankful to be able to serve in this small way.

Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Southeast Florida, and the Brotherhood was on hand to participate and to congratulate. This was the third such joint meeting, and the first in Ohio; previous meetings were in Racine WI and Toronto Canada.

Each day opened with Morning Prayer and *lectio divina* in small groups, with participants from both organizations in each gathering. There was daily Eucharist and Evensong.

Jamie Coats, Director of Friends of SSJE in Cambridge MA led a workshop on “The heart that God gave Jesus,” on two days of the conference.

It provides resources on the benefits of prayer in the digital age, with a focus on creating online communities, praying the Daily Office and other devotions, digital journalling and Scripture study. ChurchNext provides online video courses for The Episcopal Church on a variety of subjects by experts from around the church. Karekin Madteos was pleased to have been sought out as a leading expert on digital resources and models for prayer in the digital world.

Karekin Madteos has also undertaken the work of expanding his Spiritual Companionship practice in the San Francisco Bay Area into a full-time ministry. One of his spiritual companions says this about his ministry: “I have worked with Brother Karekin for many years now. He has seen me through some very intense times of discernment of my calling as a deacon and as a religious. What is the most important part of his presence is not only the love and support but the challenging that I need in order to really think, pray, articulate and move forward on my journey with God. Spiritual work, properly done, is hard. Karekin’s presence has been vital!”
