Founder's Forum

The Wise still seek

I believe most of you know that I have retired as Minister General of the Brotherhood. It has been an epiphany. Indeed it is and has brought changes to my life. Like the Wise Men, I have been searching—possibly for a star of sorts. As this is the Epiphany edition of *The Servant*, I looked back into the Archives and found what I wrote in January 1982. There it was: "Behold, I make all things new." So here is the tale....

Wise men still search the sky for understanding of the universe. What they seek now, however, is not where a star will appear, but where a star has disappeared, imploding in a burst of incredible brilliance; soon, though, it begins to radiate less energy; it becomes self-centered, turning into and onto itself, pulling in tighter and tighter until it collapses under its own gravity. It becomes a black hole that destroys not only its own light and life, but that of anything that comes near it. It is a darkness so absolute it swallows all light.

Medieval people saw an image of God's order in the heavens; modern people may see an image of their own disorder in the skies. In some ways a black hole is an inversion of Bethlehem's star. A black hole results when a star loses balance between inward and outward forces. The star that signaled the birth of Christ may also have been a dying star, but its light was not overcome by darkness, not even the darkness of death. In an outpouring of himself, the "Love that moves the sun and the other stars" comes into our heavy hearts and shadowed spirits to enlighten and enliven. Christ breaks our deadening focus on ourselves and frees us to return to a life-giving balance in which we draw energy from God and pass it on to others. Balanced thus, in peace we become instruments of God's peace. We do not have to turn away, as those Magi did, to take up life apart from God, for we know surely that in him is Life. God set a rainbow of promise in the sky as a sign that he would never again flood the sinful earth; in our hearts God sets a star of hope for the world, illumined by divine radiance: "Behold, I make all things new." Wise men still adore him. Come, star bright, Son-light, Come.

Saturday began with Morning Prayer, and then the first part of the retreat, conducted by Clayton DewAndre Johnson (Pennsylvania). As a newly professed brother, he made use of the closing chapter of the community's novitiate program, "The Religious Life: Its Future and Your Future," as a way to focus on what may be

happening in community and church life through the coming years. He led two groups of brothers through reflection questions intended both to draw on past experience and evoke hopes and concerns for the future.

However, he had been active in that Deanery for almost a decade as a Gregorian brother, and as a sustaining supporter and advisory board member of the Rio Grande Borderland Ministries.

David Luke wrote this about the area he will serve:

The Borderlands Deanery comprises roughly the southern third of the diocese including all six hundred miles of the diocesan share of the US–Mexico border from the Arizona state line to the Pecos River in south-central Texas. It includes nineteen congregations, most of which are missions, served by eleven priests and four deacons. The area covers the ground from Good Shepherd Silver City New Mexico to Santa Ynez Terlingua Texas, 457 miles to the southeast. The only urban area is El Paso/Juarez with a metro population of one million on the US side (El Paso/Las Cruces), and 2.5 million in Juarez (where the Anglican Diocese of Northern Mexico has three congregations, also engaged in ministry with asylum-seekers, refugees and immigrants.)
